MINUTES MOUNTAIN IRON CITY COUNCIL MARCH 5, 2012

Mayor Skalko called the City Council meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. with the following members present: Joe Prebeg, Jr., Tony Zupancich, Susan Tuomela, Ed Roskoski, and Mayor Gary Skalko. Also present were: Craig J. Wainio, City Administrator; Jill M. Anderson, Municipal Services Secretary; Rod Flannigan, City Engineer; Michael Downs, Interim Public Works Director; and John Backman, Sergeant.

The Mayor advised the Council Members that there is a set agenda to follow for each meeting and, if there are particular questions for Staff Members, Council members can meet with City Staff on their own time.

It was moved by Skalko and seconded by Zupancich that the consent agenda be approved as follows:

- 1. Approve the minutes of the February 21, 2012, regular meeting as submitted.
- 2. That the communications be accepted and placed on file and those requiring further action by the City Council be acted upon during their proper sequence on the agenda.
- 3. To acknowledge the receipts for the period February 16-29, 2012, totaling \$512,425.29, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).
- 4. To authorize the payments of the bills and payroll for the period February 16-29, 2012, totaling \$194,730.81, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).

The motion carried on a roll call vote.

During the public forum, John Carroll and Gary Cerkvenik, Silicon Energy, presented a proposal to the Council regarding the City of Mountain Iron's Solar Panel Project to leverage the IRRRB Grant that the City had been awarded with Federal incentive money that were available through an investment group.

It was moved by Roskoski and seconded by Tuomela to authorize the City of Mountain Iron to work with the Architect designing the Solar Panel Project to proceed with Option E. The motion carried.

It was moved by Zupancich and seconded by Tuomela to authorize the City Administrator and the City Attorney to work with Newport Partners to approve the letter of intent with a modification of the total cost of the project being \$205,000 for the Solar Panel Project. The motion carried.

The Mayor reported on the following:

- Meeting Notice. An IRRRB Listening Group meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, March 20, 2012 at the Range Recreation Civic Center in Eveleth at 5:30 p.m.
- Mountain Iron-Buhl Boys and Girls Basketball Teams. He wished the teams best of luck in their tournaments.
- ➤ Prebeg Memorial Ride. Councilor Prebeg informed the Council that over \$50,000 was raised during the February snowmobile ride. The Mayor commended the Prebeg family for completing the fundraiser for the VRMC Diabetes Center.

The City Administrator reported on the following:

- ▶ Blight Complaints. He said that before the recent snow, there were several calls into the City regarding blight and weeds. He encouraged residents to maintain their property.
- > Strategic Plan. Arrowhead Regional Development would be contacted to begin work to update the City's plan. The Council may have to hold a special meeting to work on the plan.
- Fire Department. A Fire Captain had requested a six month leave of absence beginning January 1, 2012. Applications were being accepted for the Interim Captain position and an appointment would be made by the City Administrator and the Fire Chief as per the City's policy.

The Interim Director of Public Works reported on the following:

➤ Water Line Breaks. There were two water line breaks recently. He requested that residents call the City Hall if they see water pooling and the Public Works Employees would check the area for breaks.

It was moved by Zupancich and seconded by Tuomela to authorize Benchmark Engineering to prepare plans and specifications for the curb and sidewalk at the Community Center and the Senior Center. The motion carried with Roskoski voting no.

It was moved by Tuomela and seconded by Zupancich to authorize City Staff to seek bids for the disposal of the 1926 Hamilton piano and the fountain located at the Library. The motion carried.

During the liaison reports, the following report was given:

> Building and Grounds Committee. Councilor Roskoski offered a suggestion to correct an issue with the ceiling lights at the Library.

It was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Zupancich to award the quote for the sealing of the wells and removal of the building located adjacent to the former General Electric Property to Petersen Well Drilling for their quote of \$12,900.00. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Roskoski and seconded by Tuomela to authorize the annual appropriation to Calvary Cemetery Association and Greenwood Cemetery Association in the amount of \$4,500 each as covered by State Statutes. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

During the announcements, the City Administrator advised the Council that a joint Committee-of-the-Whole meeting is scheduled with the City Council, Planning and Zoning Commission, and the Public Safety and Health Board, to discuss the proposed Rental Ordinance.

At 7:31 p.m., it was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Zupancich that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried.

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BACKGROUND

On February 6, 2012 the Mountain Iron City Council requested a feasibility report to make improvements to the Mountain Iron Water System along County Road 7 between Spruce Drive and Southern Drive. City staff directed Benchmark Engineering, Inc. to also report on the improvements of water distribution system from the Industrial Park to Bluebell Avenue along Jasmine Street and to address potential watermain crossings of County Road 7 at Jasmine Street and Gardenia Street.

Saint Louis County has indicated to Benchmark Engineering staff that they intend to make improvements to County Road 7 in 2013 within the area of this study. Saint Louis County has also requested that cities make improvements to utilities in proposed project areas, either in the year prior or in conjunction with the proposed road projects.

EXISTING CONDITIONS

This report is separated into several project areas as follows:

- County Road 7 Area (beginning at Spruce Drive and ending at Southern Drive)
- Jasmine Street Crossing (beginning at County Road 7 and ending at Daffodil Avenue along Jasmine Street)
- Gardenia Street Crossing (beginning at County Road 7 and ending at Daffodil Avenue along Gardenia Street)
- Industrial Park Area (beginning at Bluebell Avenue and Jasmine Street and ending in the Industrial Park on Higgins Drive)

Refer to the Conceptual Layout Map in the Appendix of this report for a map of the project areas.

County Road 7 Area

This area begins at Spruce Drive and follows County Road 7 southerly to Southern Drive. County Road 7, Spruce Drive and Southern Drive are all paved bituminous streets in this project area. Currently this area of County Road 7 is scheduled for a road improvement project in 2013 by Saint Louis County.

A 10" watermain is located along the west side of County Road 7 at the north end of this project area. The 10" watermain crosses County Road 7 at Spruce Drive and feeds the Ann's Acres area. This 10" watermain was constructed in 1997 and City Staff has indicated that it is in good condition.

The Virginia Public Utilities (VPU) operates a water system along Southern Drive. The VPU water system supplies water to the the trailer park and residences along Southern Drive. VPU has expressed interest in operating a water interconnection at Southern Drive to be used by either the City of Mountain Iron or VPU in an emergency situation. VPU currently has an 8" watermain along Southern Drive which dead ends at the intersection of County Road 7 on the east side. The City of Mountain Iron currently has no watermain constructed between Spruce Drive and Southern Drive in this area.

Jasmine Street Crossing

This area begins at the intersection of County Road 7 and Jasmine Street and goes to the east along Jasmine Street to the intersection of Daffodil Avenue. Jasmine Street and County Road 7 area both

paved bituminous roadways in this project area. Currently this area of County Road 7 is scheduled for a road improvement project in 2013 by Saint Louis County.

A 10" watermain is located along the west side of County Road 7 in this area. A 4" watermain is located at the intersection of Daffodil Avenue and Jasmine Street. Currently there is no other watermains in this area.

The West Virginia/West Gate water distribution systems were studied in a report dated February 16, 2011 by Benchmark Engineering. The recommendation of the report was to connect the watermain in this area via a crossing of County Road 7 in order to increase the fire flow capacity along with the potential to increase the residual pressures.

Gardenia Street Crossing

This area begins at the intersection of County Road 7 and Gardenia Street and goes to the east along Gardenia Street to the intersection of Daffodil Avenue. Gardenia Street and County Road 7 area both paved bituminous streets within this project area. Again, this area of County Road 7 is scheduled for a road improvement project in 2013 by Saint Louis County.

A 10" watermain is located along the west side of County Road 7 and a 6" watermain is located at the intersection of Daffodil Avenue and Gardenia Street. Currently there is no other watermains in this area.

The West Virginia/West Gate water distribution systems were studied in a report dated February 16, 2011 by Benchmark Engineering. As stated earlier, the recommendation of the report was to also connect the watermain in this area via a crossing of County Road 7 in order to increase the fire flow capacity along with the potential to increase the residual pressures.

Industrial Park Area

The Industrial Park Area begins on Jasmine Street at the intersection of Bluebell Avenue and extends east along Jasmine Street & Higgins Drive into the Mountain Iron Industrial Park. Jasmine Street is a paved bituminous roadway from the intersection of Bluebell Avenue to Aster Avenue, and then the street is a gravel roadway from Aster Avenue as you head east into the Industrial Park along Jasmine Street and Higgins Drive.

Currently, at the intersection of Bluebell Avenue and Jasmine Street there is an existing 4" watermain. Also, along Higgins Drive, city staff indicated that there is a 8" watermain that is supplied from North Court. There are several industrial water users along Higgins Drive and one of the largest municipal water users is located near the area that the watermain along Higgins Drive currently dead-ends. No existing flow or pressure information was made available for the Industrial Park area.

The Bluebell Avenue and Jasmine Street area is part of an area addressed in a report dated February 16, 2011 by Benchmark Engineering. As stated earlier, this report recommends looping water watermains in West Virginia and West Gate to increase the flow capacity into areas with smaller watermains.

PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The City Council and City Staff directed Benchmark Engineering to report on the feasibility of improvements to the water distribution system in the above described areas. Based upon information

available proposed improvement plans were developed for each area described above. The proposed improvements for each area are as follows.

Saint Louis County staff was contacted to discuss the coordination of this proposed project. Staff from Saint Louis County indicated that they preferred to have utilities directionally drilled if installed beneath County Road 7. If the utility crossings of County Road 7 must be open cut, the County is requiring that appropriate trench tapering is done to the subgrade, thus increasing the removal areas and overall reconstruction costs. For this reason, directional drilling will be reviewed to determine if it is a feasible construction method.

County Road 7 Watermain Extension

The water distribution system would be improved by extending a 10" watermain from Spruce Drive south along the west side of County Road 7 to South Drive. The watermain would cross County Road 7 and connect to the VPU watermain. This would allow both VPU and the City of Mountain Iron to utilize this connection in an emergency, which would otherwise compromise the safety of the municipal water distribution system. Both VPU and the City of Mountain Iron could benefit from this interconnection for use as a secondary source of municipal water.

This proposed improvement would provide municipal water directly adjacent to the west side of County Road 7 for any potential future development.

Advantages of this proposed improvement:

- Provides an connection to another source of drinking water for emergencies
- Creates more marketable properties along the west side of County Road 7
- Potential increases the future tax base
- Provides redundant connections for repair and/or emergencies

Disadvantages of this proposed improvement:

- Costs of construction
- Creates a long dead-end watermain, unless connected to VPU watermain
- Increased maintenance costs to the City of Mountain Iron water distribution system

Jasmine Street Crossing

The water distribution system would be improved by connecting the 10" watermain located along County Road 7 to the watermain at Daffodil Avenue along Jasmine Street. A 10" watermain would be extended along Jasmine Street.

Advantages of this proposed improvement:

- Increase in fire flows
- Increase in residual pressures.
- Redundant connection to the West Virginia/ West Gate area makes the water distribution system more reliable.

Disadvantages of this proposed improvement:

- Costs of construction
- Increased maintenance costs to the City of Mountain Iron water distribution system

Gardenia Street Crossing

The water distribution system would be improved by connecting the 10" watermain located along County Road 7 to the watermain at Daffodil Avenue along Gardenia Street. A 10" watermain would be extended along Gardenia Street and this proposed improvement plan would benefit West Gate area water supply system.

Advantages of this proposed improvement:

- Increase in fire flows
- Increase in residual pressures.
- Redundant connection to the West Gate areas makes the water distribution system more reliable.

Disadvantages of this proposed improvement:

- Costs of construction
- Increased maintenance costs to the City of Mountain Iron water distribution system

Industrial Park Watermain Loop

The water distribution system would be improved by connecting 8" watermain located along Higgins Drive to the watermain at Bluebell Avenue along Jasmine Street. An 8" watermain would be extended along Jasmine Street and Higgins Drive to complete this improvement. This proposed improvement plan would benefit West Virginia and West Gate areas as well as the Industrial Park.

Currently a large municipal water user is located inside of the industrial park and serviced by a dead-end watermain. If the City of Mountain Iron needs to flush this watermain, it has to be completed early in the morning or late at night. At this time, if this watermain were to break, there is no other way to service these customers until a repair is completed. With the proposed water loop it would be possible to make repairs without interrupting all of the customers located along this existing watermain through the industrial park.

This proposed improvement is focused on improvements only to the water distribution system. To minimize surface disruption directional drilling methods of construction will be analyzed to determine if they are cost effective for this portion of an improvement plan.

Advantages of this proposed improvement:

- Increase in fire flows
- Increase in residual pressures.
- Redundant connection to the Industrial Park and West Virginia/West Gate areas makes the water distribution system more reliable.
- Eliminate a dead-end watermain in the industrial park.
- Reduces maintenance costs to the City of Mountain Iron water distribution system, eliminates the need to use overtime to complete maintenance tasks.

Disadvantages of this proposed improvement:

Costs of construction

SOURCES OF FUNDING

The City of Mountain Iron has received a \$250,000 grant from Iron Range Resources for the proposed watermain extension project. City Staff has indicated if additional funds are needed to complete this project, they would likely come out of the City's General Fund.

SUMMARY

In conclusion, the afore-mentioned information attempts to summarize the existing conditions and proposed improvement plans for the water distribution system within the City of Mountain Iron.

It is our opinion that based on this information; the proposed watermain extensions are feasible and would provide the City of Mountain Iron with necessary watermain to several proposed sites suitable for future development. The watermain loops proposed are all feasible and would provide increased fire flows and residual pressures to the West Gate, West Virginia, and Industrial Park areas. In addition, the Industrial Park watermain loop would eliminate a dead-end watermain.


City staff indicated that the preferred crossing would be at Jasmine Street when compared to Gardenia Street crossing. The Jasmine Street crossing would feed into nearly the middle of West Gate and West Virginia, while the Gardenia Street Crossing would be at the south side. Benchmark Engineering reviewed the water model previously prepared to evaluate several scenarios in conjunction with the Jasmine Street crossing.

If the Industrial Park watermain loop was completed in conjunction with the Jasmine Street watermain crossing, more significant increases to the fire flows and residual pressures could be possible in the Industrial Park/West Gate and West Virginia areas. If Jasmine Street crossing was completed in conjunction with the Gardenia Street crossing there would be little benefit to the water distribution system inside of the Industrial Park, just increased flows to West Gate and West Virginia areas.

Benchmark Engineering recommends to proceed with plans and specification for the watermain extension along County Road 7 and Jasmine Street as a Base Bid, and to address the other areas with Add Alternate Bids. This will allow as much of the project to be completed as possible within the City's budget.

Directional drilling may be a feasible construction method for this project and the recommendation is to bid the project with add alternates to directionally drill in lieu of open cut construction methods. This will allow the City of Mountain Iron to select the most cost effective construction method and maximize the project's overall value per dollar spent.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation District 1 (MnDOT D-1) has prepared a Scoping Document/Draft Scoping Decision Document (SD/DSDD) for the US 53 Virginia to Eveleth project as a part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process and state environmental review process to fulfill requirements of 42 USC 4332, and Minn Statutes 116D [the Minnesota Environmental Policy Act (MEPA)]. The SD/DSDD is used before preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to reduce the scope and bulk of the EIS by selecting a reasonable range of alternatives for detailed study and identifying the appropriate level of detail for studying project impacts and issues.
