MINUTES MOUNTAIN IRON CITY COUNCIL MARCH 6, 2005

Mayor Skalko called the City Council meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. with the following members present: Joe Prebeg, Jr., Allen Nelson, Dale Irish, Ed Roskoski, and Mayor Gary Skalko. Also present were: Craig J. Wainio, City Administrator; Jill M. Forseen, Municipal Services Secretary; Don Kleinschmidt, Director of Public Works; Larry Nanti, Recreation Director; and Rod Flannigan, City Engineer.

The Mayor welcomed the audience and television viewing audience to the meeting.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Nelson that the consent agenda be approved as follows:

- 1. Move the following item on the agenda: Move V. B. to IV. C.
- 2. Approve the minutes of the February 22, 2006, City Council meeting as submitted.
- That the communications be accepted, placed on file, and those requiring further
 action by the City Council be acted upon during their proper sequence on the
 agenda.
- 4. To acknowledge the receipts for the period February 16-28, 2006, totaling \$724,516.42, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).
- 5. To authorize the payments of the bills and payroll for the period February 16-28, 2006, totaling \$391,924.34, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).

The motion carried on the following roll call vote: Prebeg, yes; Nelson, yes; Irish, yes; Roskoski, no; and Skalko, yes.

No one spoke during the public forum.

During the Mayor's report, the Mayor advised the Council that there was a public hearing held in St. Paul on February 23, 2006 and Mayor Skalko, Councilor Prebeg and Gary Cerkvenik attended the public hearing and spoke regarding the bonding for the renewable energy park. The Mayor stated that the City should be informed by mid May if the bonding is approved.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Skalko to seek quotes on landscaping the area around the Community Center/City Hall and for the purchase of picnic tables with one of the picnic tables being ADA compliant and remaining within the \$10,000 budget. The motion carried with Councilor Irish and Roskoski voting no.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Prebeg to approve the modified purchase agreement with the Mountain Iron-Buhl School District by agreeing to the stipulation that if the City does not develop the property within 10 years, the property reverts back to the Mountain Iron-Buhl School District. The motion carried with Councilor Roskoski voting no.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Nelson to approve of the transfer of the Cigarette License from Little Joe's to the Short Stop owner Phil Troutwine for 5537 Nichols Avenue, Mountain Iron. The motion carried.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Skalko to authorize the purchase of two M100 voting machines at the discounted price of \$4,426.00 plus tax per machine, also authorizing the trade in of the current voting machines along with budgeting for the new machines in 2007 and 2008. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

Councilor Roskoski asked the City Administrator if the Zoning Administrator had contact him regarding the need for P & H requiring a Conditional Use Permit. The City Administrator said that the Zoning Administrator had mentioned briefly the actions at the Planning and Zoning Commission. The City Administrator said that if the Planning and Zoning Commission directed the Zoning Administrator to contact P & H, then he should do so.

Councilor Roskoski questioned the proposal regarding the construction of a Walgreens and a bank at the intersection of Mountain Iron Drive and Highway 53. The Mayor advised Councilor Roskoski that this is private property and the private developer can do what they want with the property as long as they apply for a building permit. The Mayor said that as of this date, no permit application had been submitted.

Councilor Roskoski questioned the Director of Public Works regarding the project plans for next Summer. The Director of Public Works said that he was not prepare to give a report on the Summer projects, but could at a future meeting if the Council desires this information.

Councilor Roskoski questioned the Director of Public Works regarding the purchase of a plow truck. Councilor Roskoski said that he would discuss this further during open discussion.

The Mayor asked the Director of Public Works about the meeting with Virginia regarding the 16th Avenue upgrade. The Director of Public Works said that the Street Committee met and are seeking additional information regarding 16th Avenue. The Mayor said that this needs to be taken care of as soon as possible.

It was moved by Irish and supported by Prebeg to prepare specifications and seek quotes for electrical upgrades at the West Two Rivers Campground. The motion carried.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Prebeg to seek quotes for materials and installation of new gates, fencing and lighting for the Wolf Park. The motion carried.

It was moved by Roskoski to direct Benchmark Engineer to survey the sewer area in the intersection of Spruce Drive and Aspen Lane to see how much the sanitary sewer manhole would have to be raised to prevent inflow into the sanitary sewer. After further discussion, Councilor Roskoski withdrew the motion and requested that this be put on the next City Council agenda.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Nelson to accept the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission and approve the Conditional Use Permit for Gerald

Claesson to construct a garage 1008 square feet on parcel 175-0055-01275. The motion carried.

During the Liaison Reports, the Mayor said that he spoke with the Librarian and asked her for the list of top priorities for additional improvements at the Library.

Councilor Nelson reported that the Planning and Zoning Commission discussed the garage recently constructed in the easement in the Downtown Mountain Iron area. He said that the Zoning Administrator was going to investigate the situation and report back to the City Council.

Councilor Roskoski thanked the City Engineer for submitting the information to the City Council regarding the proposed development in the Mountain Iron Drive and Highway 53 area. The Mayor said that he spoke with the developer regarding the City's concerns with the street in that area.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Skalko to adopt Resolution Number 03-06, application for a grant for the Wastewater Treatment Plant maintenance, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg to adopt Resolution Number 04-06, setting a hearing on vacation, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried with Councilor Roskoski voting no.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Irish to adopt Resolution Number 05-06, Charitable Gambling, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried.

The Council reviewed the list of requests for Mineland Reclamation funding.

Councilor Irish was looking for a report of outstanding indebtedness. The City Administrator said that he would contact Northland Securities to obtain an updated report. Councilor Roskoski requested the amount of bonding authority that is available to the City. The Mayor suggested that Council members go into the City Hall and speak with City Staff to request this information.

Councilor Prebeg asked when the City Auditor would be at the Council meeting to present the 2005 audit report. The City Administrator said that he did not have a date set at this time.

Councilor Irish was requesting a monthly breakdown of health insurance costs, including third party payments of all active and non-active employees for 2005. The City Administrator said that he would submit the information to the Council.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Prebeg to approve change order number five for the library renovation project in the amount of \$285.00. The motion carried on the following roll call vote: Irish, yes; Roskoski, yes; Prebeg, yes; Nelson, no; and Skalko, yes.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Prebeg to approve partial payment estimate number seven in the amount of \$11,300.00 to Lenci Enterprises. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Skalko to authorize the building rental fees to be waived for a fundraiser dinner for the Mountain Iron-Buhl Baseball Team on April 9, 2006. The motion carried.

The Council reviewed the list of communications.

During the open discussion, Councilor Roskoski reviewed the list of city owned plowing and sanding vehicles. The Mayor suggested that Councilor Roskoski come in to the City Hall and speak to City Staff personally regarding these issues.

Also during the open discussion, Councilor Nelson spoke and clarified an article in the newspaper regarding the library renovation project; he said that he is not supportive of the project, but votes for the payments on the project because it is a legal obligation for the City to pay the bills for the projects.

At 7:42 p.m, it was moved by Roskoski and supported by Prebeg to recess the regular meeting to go into a closed session to discuss and review contract strategies for contract negotiations with AFSCME Union #453. The motion carried.

At 7:50 p.m., the Mayor called the close session to order.

At 8:09 p.m., it was moved by Nelson and supported by Roskoski that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried.



Members of the City Council:

This letter concerns the assisted living facility that Five Star Living of Virginia / Mt. Iron will construct on the property just south of the Mt. Iron City Hall and Community Center between Enterprise Drive South and Unity Drive. As you will recall, the Council unanimously approved the re-zoning request (#29-36) for this project on February 6, 2006. At that time, it was proposed to create access to the facility off of Enterprise Drive, and to bring utilities in along that corridor as well. That was the plan that was presented to the Planning Commission as well as the City Council.


The results of subsequent site investigation have necessitated a change in the site layout, however. The geotechnical analysis showed a large area of fill material on the original building site, and these unsuitable soils, combined with the slope conditions, have caused the building to be placed further south on the site as is shown in the accompanying site plan. While utilities will still be brought in from Enterprise Drive, the new layout would create an excessively long driveway which would have a steep hill down to the building site. It makes much more sense to construct a short driveway off of Unity Drive from the southeast corner of the lot, and that is what is proposed in this site plan modification. This approach will allow the planting of a much larger landscape buffer between the project and the Community Center as well.

During the public meetings, several neighbors expressed concern over the amount of traffic that would be generated if access were created off of Unity Drive, and this is a normal concern. In this case, however, the impact on the neighborhood should be minimal: since none of the facility residents will be able to drive, daily traffic would be limited to the three staff per shift and the occasional visitor or delivery vehicle. Because of this minimal impact, we see this access change as a minor revision to the project rather than a substantive change, and we hope you will concur.

PLANNING & ZONING COMMISSION MINUTES

MOUNTAIN IRON, MINNESOTA

JANUARY 23, 2006

The regular meeting of the Mountain Iron Planning and Zoning Commission was called to order by Chairman Steve Giorgi at 7:00 p.m. Members present were Ray Saari, Steve Skogman, Margaret Soyring, Jim Giorgi, Steve Giorgi, Barb Fivecoate and Vicky Juntunen. Also present were Zoning Administrator Jerry Kujala. Councilman Allen Nelson was attending the City Council Meeting, held at the same time.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

A motion was made by Juntunen with support from Saari to accept the minutes of the December 12th meeting and passed unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING

At 7:05 p.m. a motion to close the regular meeting and open the Public Hearing for a Zoning Request for 5-Star Living was made by Fivecoate with support from J. Giorgi and passed unanimously. Mr. Mike Conlin, representing owner Mike Kratt, gave a presentation on the assisted living project. It is 4.3 acres of land & there will be two one story building units, holding up to ten beds per unit and will be strictly an assisted living facility. The entrance/exit will come off of Enterprise Drive South (next to City Hall) & there will be no entrance/exit off of Unity Drive. There will be minimal traffic in and out of the facility, as residents will not be able to drive. Mr. Conlin then entertained questions by anyone present and answered any concerns. Present was a neighbor, Dick Matyska, who was not against the project, but had questions he and his wife had discussed. How many units and one or two story buildings? This was answered in presentation. Matyska also asked about rain run-off and would it flow onto the streets below Unity Drive. Conlin explained there will be a big retention pond on the property that will handle water run-off or it may go into the city sewer system, which is not determined yet. Another neighbor, Tara Wainio, was not against the project, but was concerned about the lighting and if the buildings would be the same earthtone colors as deed restrictions required of the houses in Unity Addition. Conlin showed colored pictures of the buildings (which had earthtone siding & stone) and assured Wainio that the buildings would be far enough in on the property that residents on Unity Addition would not be affected by the lighting. Wainio's biggest concern was no entrance /exit off of Unity Drive & increased traffic and any out buildings, will they be the same style & not pole buildings. Conlin assured her that there would be only the two buildings, no entrance/exit off Unity Drive and felt traffic would come and go off of Highway #169 mainly. Another neighbor (to the East), Nicole Felton, is not against the project either, but had concerns of people thinking the entrance/exit would be off of Unity Drive & would increase traffic to her driveway. She also, questioned where the utilities would come from for the project? Conlin explained that the utilities would come from up above, by City Hall, and there would be no entrance/exit off Unity Drive. Another neighbor (to the West), Emil Johnson was, also, not against the project but questioned if this would affect his zoning? Kujala explained that he was not sure if this property could be "spot zoned" and may have to re-zone all the way West to the Arrowhead Library Building, which would include several properties. Kujala will seek an opinion from our City Attorney on the matter, to "spot zone" and report back. No written correspondence was received.

At 7:24 p.m. a motion was made to close the Public Hearing & resume the regular Planning and Zoning Commission meeting by Fivecoate with support from J. Giorgi and passed unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS

Public Hearing---

A motion was made to rezone the parcel of property for the assisted living project from URS to MF2, with an opinion

and approval by City Attorney, Sam Aluni, to Spot Zone the property, by Skogman with support from Fivecoate and passed unanimously. Skogman felt it was a good commercial mix and is a good project for our area. S. Giorgi, too, felt it was a good transectional area and this project fits in well.

UPS sign----

Discussion was held on the request for a sign to be put up for UPS to advise customers where their package drop-off/pick-up area is. It was stopped in the past because it was on City property. Now they have a permit to erect a sign, but it is an off-site sign (across the street) and requires a Conditional Use Permit. Kujala will talk to them and direct further action for an off-site sign. No action was taken.

Election Of Officers for 2006-----

President-Steve Giorgi, Vice--President Steve Skogman, Secretary--Barb Fivecoate all accepted nomination and unanimously passed by acclamation vote.

ZONING ADMINISTRATORS REPORT

Kujala reported that Dallas Fiskari has added an enclosure to the door and a new garage door on the old Mountain Iron Video Store on County Road 7 and Unity Drive and has not secured a building permit. He will check out the project.

Kujala explained a mistake that was made on the original zoning map that needs to be corrected. The line was drawn wrong on the original re-zoning map. It should be URS or MF2 on Daffodil Avenue and Commercial from the corner of Daffodil Avenue and Unity Drive to County Road 7 and South on County Road 7. It needs to be corrected and a Public Hearing will be held to do so.

ADJOURN

At 7:55 p.m. a motion to adjourn was made by Soyring with support from Juntunen and passed unanimously.

Eminent domain restrictions clear first Senate committee

Yesterday afternoon, the Senate Judiciary Committee considered a sweeping proposal to restrict the use of eminent domain, which is authored by Sen. Tom Bakk (DFL-Cook) and supported by the Institute for Justice and the Minnesota Automobile Dealers Association (SF 2750). The committee also discussed a more reasonable alternative supported by the League of Minnesota Cities (SF 2694). Among those who appeared to offer their support for SF 2750, were: Mayor Bjorn Skogquist, city of Anoka; Amy Ihlan, Roseville city councilmember; and Mayor Herb Bergson, city of Duluth. Those opposed to SF 2750 did not have an opportunity to offer testimony to the bill.

When the committee reconvened Thursday evening, Sen. Don Betzold (DFL-Fridley) offered a delete-all amendment to SF 2750. The amendment included several procedural provisions from SF 2694; the section dealing with definitions from SF 2750, including definitions of "abandoned property," "blighted area," "dilapidated building," and "environmentally contaminated area"; the restrictions in SF 2750

on acquiring non-dilapidated and uncontaminated property; a higher evidentiary standard—preponderance of the evidence—for takings for redevelopment purposes; payment of property owners' attorney fees for a successful public purpose challenge; a modified loss of going concern provision; the higher re-establishment cap from SF 2694; and a March 1, 2006 effective date. The committee adopted the Betzold deleteall amendment with a couple of technical changes.

The committee also adopted an amendment, offered by Sen. Julianne Ortman (R-Chanhassen), to allow payment of property owners' attorney fees if the final award is at least 20% greater than the last written offer made by the condemning authority before filing a petition in court. The committee will reconvene at 6:00 p.m. in Room 123 to vote on amendments to SF 2750.

State of the State

In his annual state of the state address, Governor Tim Pawlenty focused most of his comments on his upcoming legislative initiatives on school and health care reforms. He did, however, mention three issues that are of importance to cities: funding for impaired waters, property tax limits and eminent domain reform.

Cleaning up impaired waters

The Governor's speech gave a boost to the efforts of the League and others working to pass the Clean Water Legacy Act by supporting our request for \$20 million in funding this session for the state's impaired waters program. He went on to say that ongoing funding for that program should be part of the proposed constitutional amendment for dedicating sales tax revenues to natural resources protection.

The current draft of the Clean Water Legacy Act seeks \$20 million in general fund resources and \$20 million in resources from the bonding bill. These resources would be used to fund, among other things, small communities replacing failing septic systems and to cover 75% of the cost of phosphorus treatment infrastructure on city wastewater plants, both in the future and retroactively back to March 2000.

Property Tax Cap

The Governor's mention of property tax limits was the first public comment on this issue we have heard this year. Last fall when the preliminary levy information was compiled, the Department of Revenue reported that the aggregate increase in proposed property taxes for cities was 9.2 percent—a higher proposed increase than we have seen in recent years. At that time, we expected to hear criticism of

cities—including possible calls for levy limits or even more restrictive reverse referendum proposals. We only heard a few grumblings.

The final certified levy increase was reduced to a 7.9 percent increase—still significant, but given the deep aid cuts imposed in 2003 ands 2004 and the extremely tight levy limits that were in place in 2004, the figure was not surprising. The final aggregate levy increase of 7.9 percent was much closer to the aggregate increases of recent years.

Now, as we approach the fall "campaign season," local governments, including cities, may be caught between a clash of the titans. Recently, House minority leader Matt Entenza publicly blamed local property tax increases on the Governor's budget balancing policies.

Perhaps by coincidence or perhaps in response, the Governor has now publicly mentioned the idea of imposing a "cap", presumably on cities, counties and possibly schools to control future property tax increases.

Meanwhile, cities go on doing their business of serving the day-to-day needs of Minnesota citizens.

Eminent Domain

In his speech, the Governor stated, "One of the most important roles of government is to protect its citizens. Sometimes that means protecting them from their own government. I urge us to come together to pass meaningful and responsible reforms to Minnesota's eminent domain laws."

In recent weeks, the Institute for Justice (IJ)/Minnesota Automobile Dealers Association (MADA) has suggested that the Governor is supporting their eminent domain legislation.

Interestingly, the Governor did not publicly endorse their bill in his speech. Unfortunately, he did not endorse the League proposal either.

The IJ/MADA pitch has been to adopt "meaningful" reform while the League has been endorsing "responsible" reform. His use of both of those terms in his speech may be coincidence or may be a call for compromise.

The Governor's supplemental budget, which will include recommendations on many new initiatives, will be unveiled in the coming weeks. Stay tuned.

Final consideration of important competitive cable legislation

Please contact the member(s) of the Minnesota House of Representatives who represent your city to urge members of the House Regulated Industries Committee to vote for HF 1319 (Beard, R-Shakopee), legislation that the League of Minnesota Cities (LMC) and the Minnesota Association of Community Telecommunications Administrators (MACTA) support. On Wednesday, March 15, HF 1319 is scheduled to be on the agenda of the House Regulated Industries Committee for final consideration Jim Smith Immediate Past President of the Association of Metropolitan Municipalities and a member of the Lake Minnetonka Cable Communications Committee, testified in support of the bill on behalf of LMC at the first hearing on the bill earlier this week. The bill enlarges and strengthens the role of cities and multijurisdictional cable commissions in granting competitive cable franchises and prevents discrimination of low-income subscribers in providing access to such services.

The cable industry, as well as Qwest Communications, oppose the bill because it gives local officials more discretion in setting requirements for areas of the community to be served as well as in negotiating the terms of the additional franchising that provide for building out the competitive cable system and interconnecting public local origination, educational and government (PEG) programming and delivery of existing video production on the same channels.
