MINUTES MOUNTAIN IRON CITY COUNCIL MAY 15, 2006

Mayor Skalko called the City Council meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. with the following members present: Joe Prebeg, Jr., Allen Nelson, Dale Irish, Ed Roskoski, and Mayor Gary Skalko. Also present were: Craig J. Wainio, City Administrator; Jill M. Forseen, Municipal Services Secretary; Don Kleinschmidt, Director of Public Works; Rod Flannigan, City Engineer; Larry Nanti, Recreation Director; and Wade Rasch, Sergeant.

The Mayor welcomed the audience and the television viewing audience to the meeting.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Nelson that the consent agenda be approved as follows:

- 1. Add the following items to the agenda:
 - IV. A. 4. Letter of Retirement-Gerald Claesson
 - IV. G. 2. Blight Problem in Parkville
- 2. Approve the minutes of the May 1, 2006, City Council meeting as submitted. Page 5, paragraph 5...to obtain dial-a-ride service in all or part of the Mountain Iron....
- 3. That the communications be accepted, placed on file, and those requiring further action by the City Council be acted upon during their proper sequence on the agenda.
- 4. To acknowledge the receipts for the period May 1-15, 2006, totaling \$173,875.83, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).
- 5. To authorize the payments of the bills and payroll for the period May 1-15, 2006, totaling \$208,403.65, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).

The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

No one spoke during the public forum.

The Mayor updated the Council regarding the following items:

- South Grove Playground-will be setting up the equipment tentatively on June 21, 2006. There is a \$20,000 land grant from Saint Louis County and the City appropriated \$25,000 to the South Grove Playground Project.
- Downtown area-the banners and flowers will be done shortly.
- Downtown area-Locomotive Park-no bids were received on the painting of the locomotive, so the Recreation Director is negotiating with some contractors to

paint the locomotive. The drinking fountain should be installed at Locomotive Park soon.

- Library-exterior should be completed soon. City Staff will be obtaining estimates for the interior work to be presented at the second City Council meeting in June. There is approximately \$100,000 left to be expended on the project.
- Christmas Lighting-will be installed on Mineral Avenue in the Downtown and South Grove areas and along Nichols Drive and Parkville Road in the Parkville area.
- TEA21 Federal Grant-will be available in October 2007, about \$140,000 grant, with a 20% local match, for streetscape and vintage lighting projects.
- Ordinance for recreation vehicles and big boats being parked on city streets-the city will be enforcing the ordinance.
- Bonding Bill for the infrastructure for the renewable energy park-has made it through the conference committee and is still in the running.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Nelson to develop a feasibility study for the conceptual plan for the layout of Unity Second Addition. The motion carried.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Irish to allocate \$300 to be used to secure funding for the Highway 53 expansion project. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Nelson to set a Labor/Management meeting for Thursday, May 25, 2006, and direct the City Administrator to send meeting notices to Local Union #453 and the Union Representative. The motion carried.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Skalko to accept the retirement request of Gerald Claesson with an effective date of May 26, 2006. The motion carried.

During the Administrator's report, Councilor Roskoski asked if the City Administrator had received the traffic counts from the City Engineer. The Administrator said that the City had completed the traffic counts. The City Engineer stated that he would forward this information on the traffic counts to the City Administrator.

Councilor Roskoski asked the City Administrator if P & H MinePro had responded to the request for them to apply for a Conditional Use Permit. The City Administrator said that he had not received a response from P & H MinePro.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg to authorize the purchase of a standby generator from Interstate Power Systems in the amount of \$21,565.00 with the expense being funded through the Wastewater Treatment Plant Fund. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Skalko to authorize City Staff to call for bids for the disposal of one (1) 1996 one ton dump body and snowplow, vehicle identification

number 1GBJK34J8TE228701 and license number 138 973. The motion carried with Councilor Roskoski voting no.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg to authorize the purchase of the following power poles from Minnesota Power:

with the total cost between \$8,580.00 and \$10,725.00. This purchase would be funded from the 2006 Electric Department Enterprise Fund. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Skalko to accept the recommendation of the Mountain Iron Parks and Recreation Board and hired the following summer staff for 2006 as follows:

The motion carried.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Prebeg to accept the recommendation of the Park and Recreation Board and coaches that are 25 years and older at the rate of \$300.00 per team per season for coaching in the 12 years and younger divisions in the summer ball program. The motion carried.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Irish to authorize City Staff to purchase the following tables for the veranda at the Community Center:

Four (4) tables at \$750.00 = \$3,000.00 One (1) table at \$760.00 = \$ 760.00 Shipping = \$1,080.00 TOTAL = \$4,840.00

Councilor Prebeg asked the Recreation Director if any bids were received on the Community Center landscaping. The Recreation Director said they were seeking quotes.

Councilor Nelson asked the Recreation Director what the status of the West Virginia Skating rink was. The Recreation Director said that the Board would be reviewing this in the Fall

During the Sheriff's Department report, the Sergeant reported that the traffic stops were high for the small office. He said that the deputy's have been making many custodial arrests during traffic stops. The Sergeant said that one new deputy has started work in the Mountain Iron office and two more would be starting in a few weeks.

The City Attorney reviewed the information sheet regarding donations to charitable organizations.

The Council reviewed the information received from the City Attorney regarding potential land exchanges.

Councilor Roskoski asked the City Attorney if a Conditional use Permit application was received from P & H MinePro. The Attorney said that he was only aware of the letter sent by the Zoning Administrator to P & H MinePro.

It was moved by Roskoski to direct Mr. Aluni to work with the City Administrator and the Zoning Administrator.....the Mayor stopped Councilor Roskoski from making a motion. Councilor Roskoski said that the P & H MinePro issue should be on the next regular meeting agenda.

Councilor Nelson stated that the blight situation in Parkville has not been taken care of and was wondering what the status of the situation was. The Sergeant stated that Mr. Nordlund had been cited and had attended a court date on May 1, 2006 and paid a fine at that time. The Sergeant said that the Judge gave Mr. Nordlund until June 1, 2006 to get into compliance for the items that he was cited for. The Sergeant said that he would be monitoring the progress completed on the property and issued further citations if they are applicable.

During the Liaison Reports, Councilor Nelson updated the Council regarding the EDA. He stated that the EDA did approve the development agreement for Park Ridge Development. He advised the Council that there is a new business that is looking at locating behind United Electric and the EDA is working on a development agreement for this project. He said that P & H MinePro is aware of where the EDA is on this project and any action would have to come from them.

The Mayor informed the Council that he had received a phone call from David Buria regarding a power outage from a storm that occurred after hours. Mr. Buria said that he appreciated the work completed by the City Staff, Jeff Marks and Steve Kottke and others that may have responded.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Skalko, as per past practice, that the City offer this parcel of land, the former Ann's Acres Water Company site, half to one adjacent property owners and the other half to the other property owner, and if either party on either side does not want the parcel, that one party can purchase the entire parcel, at a cost of \$2000, and adopt Resolution Number 10-06, authorizing the sale of certain property, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried with Councilor Nelson voting no.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Skalko to adopt Resolution Number 16-06, receiving report and calling hearing on improvement, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Skalko to direct the City Administrator and the City Attorney to investigate the request by Edward and Lynda Klimek to purchase land in Section 15, Township 58 North, Range 18 West and bring the information to the next regular meeting. The motion carried.

Councilor Prebeg stated that there was no need to have a closed meeting because the next negotiation sessions were scheduled for May 18th and 22nd, 2006.

At 7:43 p.m., it was moved by Nelson and supported by Skalko that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried.





Staff has reviewed the request by Mr. and Mrs. Klimek to purchase property on the south and east side of their lot. Based upon this review, staff recommends that the land requested to the south of the Klimek lot not be sold to the Klimek's. With the dimensions of the area, the City would be better off selling the property as a lot for a single family home to be constructed. Staff also recommends that the maximum sale to the east of the Klimek property be 20 feet.

The dump relocation agreement between the City and the MPCA give the City the ability to dispose of the dump cleanup material from the Mountain Timber property to the former East Mesabi Landfill. By placing the material at the former landfill the costs of disposal should decrease compared to the possibility of paying tipping fees. Mr. Sam Aluni has reviewed and signed off on the agreement.

It is recommended that the City Council approve the Dump Relocation Agreement with the MPCA.

CITY OF MOUNTAIN IRON FORMER DUMP RELOCATION AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) is responsible for administering the Landfill Cleanup Program, Minn. Stat. §§ 115B.39-115B.445 (2004) (hereinafter the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Mountain Iron is the owner of the waste disposal site known as the Former Mountain Iron Dump (hereinafter the "Dump") and desires to transport dump materials from the Dump to the former East Mesabi Landfill (hereinafter the "Landfill"), a qualified facility which is subject to a Landfill Cleanup Agreement between the Commissioner of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, Saint Louis County (hereinafter the "County"), pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§ 115B.39 - 115B.445; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 115B.403 authorizes the Commissioner to allow dump materials from publicly owned sites to be transported to qualified facilities under the provisions of that section; and

WHEREAS, the dump materials will be used for improved contouring prior to construction of a new cover at the Landfill; and

WHEREAS, the MPCA hereby agrees to the City's transport of dump materials from the Dump and their disposal at the Landfill for use as specified herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>Parties</u>. The parties to this Agreement are:
 - a. the Commissioner of the MPCA (hereinafter the "Commissioner"), and
 - b. the City of Mountain Iron (hereinafter the "City").
- 2. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the timely and orderly transport and disposal of dump materials from the Former Mountain Iron Dump to the Landfill in a manner that does not present a hazard to public safety and is in compliance with the Act and other applicable laws.

- 3. <u>Definitions</u>. Unless otherwise stated, the definitions set forth in the Act shall apply to this Agreement.
- 4. <u>Property</u>. Exhibit A, incorporated herein, is a map showing the vicinity of the Dump and the Landfill. The City of Mountain Iron entered the Dump site into the Minnesota Voluntary Investigation Cleanup (VIC) Program on January 27, 2003. The VIC Site Application is attached hereto as Exhibit B. The Dump occupies approximately 1.5 acre of land located in the Northwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 10, Township 58 North, Range 18 West, in the City of Mountain Iron, Saint Louis County, Minnesota. (See site map, Exhibit A.)

The State of Minnesota is the owner of the Landfill. The Landfill is located as described in the "Facility location" section of the Minnesota Solid Waste Disposal Permit #97 issued to the Saint Louis County on October 18, 1972. The Landfill is located in Virginia Township, in St. Louis County in the West ½ of Section 15 and the East ½ of Section 16, Township 58 North, Range 17 West.

- 5. <u>City's Responsibilities</u>. The City shall:
 - a. Excavate and remove all dump materials and contaminated soils from the Dump and transport them in covered trucks to the Landfill, in accordance with the City's MPCA approved Voluntary Response Action Plan (VRAP) (See Voluntary Response Action Plan, Exhibit C). The VRAP was approved by the MPCA on April 28, 2004 (See MPCA approval letter, Exhibit D).
 - b. Pay all costs of inspection of materials excavated from the Dump. No prohibited materials shall be taken from the Dump to the Landfill. Prohibited materials include the materials listed in Minn. R. 7035.1700, subp.V(1)-V(4), Minn. R. 7035.2535, subp.1A-1G, the items excluded from the definition of "solid waste" provided by Minn. R. 7035.0300, subp. 100, asbestos, and food wastes. The MPCA Project Manager, or his or her official designee, is authorized to reject, at either location, any materials excavated from the Dump for relocation to the Landfill that are prohibited under the SW97 permit. Any dump materials that are not permissible at the Landfill shall be disposed of by the City at its sole expense at a disposal site authorized to accept such materials and in accordance with state and federal rules and regulations.
 - c. Dump material will be placed at the Landfill in accordance to the MPCA approved "Fill Placement Management Plan". The "Fill Placement Management Plan" will specify items such as fill location(s), erosion control, site preparation prior to filling, slopes, type and thickness of final soil cover material and site restoration.

- d. Provide daily cover of the dump materials at the Landfill if such dump materials are found to be subject to being dispersed by wind, vermin or other external factors. The MPCA Project Manager or designee shall determine the need for daily cover materials. To the extent that daily cover soils or materials are available at the site, the MPCA Project Manager or designee shall permit the City to use such materials that are designated for that purpose.
- e. Prevent dispersion of the dump materials at the Landfill as the materials arrive, as required by the MPCA Project Manager or designee.
- f. Maintain the cleanliness of roads and multi-use trail between the sites, especially the Mesabi Trail multi use trail which is the access to the Landfill, by using a sweeper or other equipment during transportation of the dump materials, as needed.
- g. Pay all costs and repair any damage to the Landfill access via the multi-use trail caused by the City's transportation of dump materials, if the damage to these roads is greater than normal wear and tear as reasonably determined by the MPCA Project Manager.
- h. Substantially complete delivery of dump materials to the Landfill within 60 days of the City contractor's initiation of the project and finally complete delivery of dump materials by July 31, 2006. The City shall make arrangements with its contractors as necessary to assure timely performance. The City agrees to this schedule in acknowledgment that time is of the essence if the Commissioner is to timely complete closure activities at the Landfill.
- i. Receive an extension of time only for good cause. The City shall have the burden to demonstrate good cause, which shall be limited to weather, road conditions, stoppage of work pursuant to Paragraph 8 of this Agreement, and circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the City, its officers, agents, or contractors. Request for an extension must be submitted in a timely manner in writing to the MPCA Project Manager. The Commissioner shall determine whether good cause exists and the length of any extension.
- j. Estimate the volume of material removed from the Dump and delivered to the Landfill by documenting the number and volume of each truck hauling dump materials to the Landfill.
- k. Remove soils and materials presently covering the Landfill and use them to provide temporary runoff controls, as needed, or stockpile them, or use them for cover material. In order to prepare the Landfill for acceptance of the dump materials, the City shall notify the Commissioner one week before it intends to begin delivery of the dump materials.
- 1. Prepare the grade for a temporary haul road.

- m. Provide necessary personnel at the Landfill to direct dumping and placement of dump materials and at the Dump to oversee removal of dump materials.
- n. Alert its contractors to potential changes in starting dates, if weather conditions require any changes.
- o. Bear any and all costs of performing all activities agreed upon by the City, unless any provision of this Agreement specifically states otherwise.

6. Commissioner's Responsibilities. The Commissioner shall:

- a. Provide the City or its agents with a rough sketch showing the temporary haul road grade and the area allowed for the placement of dump materials.
- b. Provide the City or its agent access to and no-cost use of cover material presently available at the Landfill, if needed.
- 7. <u>Access.</u> The Commissioner or any authorized representative shall have the right to enter the Dump at all times for any inspections, surveys, or response actions; or to inspect records, operating logs, or other relevant documents.
- 8. <u>Creation of Danger</u>. If the Commissioner determines that the activities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement, or any other circumstances or activities, are creating a danger to health or welfare at the Dump, the Landfill or in the surrounding area or in the environment, the Commissioner may order the City to stop further implementation of this Agreement for the period of time needed to abate the danger. The City shall comply with the order from the Commissioner upon receipt or upon verbal notice of the contents of the order from the MPCA Project Manager.
- 9. <u>Project Manager</u>. The Commissioner has designated an MPCA Project Manager and Alternate (hereinafter jointly referred to as the MPCA Project Manager) for the purpose of overseeing the implementation of this Agreement. The MPCA Project Managers are Ron Schwartz and Peter Tiffany. The City of Mountain Iron Project Manager is Don Kleinschmidt. The City's contractor is Wenck Associates whose representative is Joseph Palo, Project

Manager. Each party shall notify the other party of a change in Project Manager, for itself or its contractor, promptly in writing.

The MPCA Project Manager shall have the authority to (1) take samples or direct that samples be taken, if the necessity of such sampling is agreed to by the City; (2) direct that work stop for a period not to exceed seventy-two (72) hours if the MPCA Project Manager determines that activities at the Landfill may create a danger to the public health, welfare, or the environment; (3) observe, take photographs, and make such other reports on the progress of the work as the MPCA Project Manager deems appropriate; (4) review records, files, and documents relevant to this Agreement; and (5) make or authorize minor field modifications in techniques, procedures, or design utilized in carrying out this Agreement which are necessary for the completion of the remedial action, with the City's consent.

Liability Insurance. Before commencing any work at the Landfill to carry out 11. response actions required by this Agreement, the City's contractor shall provide the Commissioner with current certificates of insurance certifying coverage for general liability with minimum limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and with an annual aggregate of at least Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000), exclusive of legal defense costs, for claims of bodily injury and property damage resulting from work required to implement this In addition, the City shall require its contractor to provide Comprehensive Agreement. Automobile Liability coverage, including all owned (private and other), hired and non-owned vehicles, for and in behalf of the Contractor and protecting the Contractor from claims for damages for bodily injuries, including sickness, disease, or death and for care and loss of services, as well as from claims for property damage including loss of use, which may arise from operations under the Contract, whether such operations be by the Contractor or by any subcontractor or by anyone directly or indirectly employed by either of them, in the following minimum amounts:

a. Bodily Injury

\$1,000,000 \$1,000,000 Each Person
Each Accident

b. Property Damage \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence

The insurance coverage shall provide that it cannot be canceled for any reason except after thirty (30) calendar days written notice to the Commissioner. These insurance limits are not to be construed as maximum limits. The City is solely responsible for determining the appropriate amount of insurance it should carry for injuries or damages resulting from work required to implement this Agreement. The City may satisfy the requirements of this paragraph by providing certificates of insurance showing that the required coverage has been provided by the City's contractors and that the City is named as additional insured under the contractor's insurance.

- 12. <u>Amendment</u>. This Agreement may be amended only by a written agreement of the parties, dated and signed.
- 13. Termination. The obligations of the City under this Agreement shall be deemed satisfied and this Agreement may be terminated upon receipt by the City of written notice from the Commissioner that the City has demonstrated, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner, that all actions required under this Agreement have been completed and all terms and conditions of this Agreement have been performed. This Agreement may be canceled prior to the initiation of any waste excavation activity by any party upon thirty (30) calendar days written notice to the other party.
- 14. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Agreement shall be effective upon the latest of the dates it is executed by the parties.

Dear Gary,

In recent weeks there has been media coverage regarding a lynching sign posted near Mountain Iron's post office. One of the implications is that I should not have dredged up forgotten information for the sign. As a result, my name has been used in numerous newspaper articles and at an April council meeting.

So that you might make informed comments in the future, I am enclosing evidence to prove that Mountain Iron's lynching was never a forgotten issue. Here are the facts:

- ◆ In 2005, J. Robert Beck, a 1941 Mountain Iron graduate, published a book entitled "Well, Here We Are" that told about Mountain Iron's lynching on page 104. The book is available on the internet. (See attachment A)
- ◆ Several years earlier, Beck distributed a manuscript entitled "Rich Without Money" that recounted the lynching incident. (See attachment B)
- ◆ Michael Pfeifer, a professor at Evergreen State College in Olympia, Washington, has maintained a lynching website for several years that can be accessed by typing Minnesota lynching or Frank Belange into Google. Second from the top we see the name of Mountain Iron. (See attachment C)
- ◆ During the Bicentennial year of 1976, your local newspaper, the Mountain Iron Maverick, carried two lengthy articles on the lynching; the first article appeared on July 7 and the second on July 21. In the second article, a 1915 Mountain Iron graduate, Elizabeth Peltier, takes exception to the first article and gives her version. The newspaper can be viewed on microfilm at Iron World's Research Center. (See attachment D)

The trail sign did not mushroom out of the ground during the night. It was installed more than six months ago and was read by many residents including some council members. It was not found to be offensive because the lynching incident is common Mt. Iron knowledge. Nothing was done until the MDN article appeared and then a few council members, behaving like rats on an electrified grid, began searching for victims. Several of us became scapegoats so that some, in the style of Pontius Pilate, might wash their hands in public.

Because you and another council member have not been reticent about using my name, I was looking forward to viewing and recording your May 2 council meeting. Unfortunately, this was not possible due to "staff error." I am asking that you describe to me in letter the exact "staff error" encountered that precluded telecasting of the council meeting. We need to keep in mind that a public meeting remains a public meeting whether televised or not.

With limited opportunities for even a modest income, the citizens of the Mesabi through this arrangement and a very low cost of living were provided a much higher standard of living than their meager earnings would have given them anywhere else. It was probably this that made the inhabitants of the Mesabi Range in the 1930s far happier than one would expect.

This background makes me less inclined than most of my successful business executive colleagues to look on government or corporate largess toward the unfortunate poor as an evil. It was not until I became a manager with bottom line responsibility that I questioned Eastman Kodak's unusual altruistic practice (during most of my career there) of keeping a significant percentage of employees who were sub marginal producers on the payroll. Nevertheless, I believe that my peers from the Mesabi, whose parents might not have survived without that unique subsidy, have made more than average significant contributions to improve the United States economy, professions, government, and arts. I suppose this is why I support so-called liberals who believe that subsidizing the poor can be a good investment for the future. I have seen it work, and work well. (Twice, actually, but more later about the second example.)

There were some other events that happened in Mountain Iron that I remember or heard about that might be worth mentioning. In 1894 when the town was only about four years old there had been a lynching there. A young French itinerant who spoke little or no English was impolitely urged to get on his way. It appears that he may have stopped a couple of miles out of town to relieve himself and a couple of young girls from the town observed him through the bushes. They reported this in a way that made him sound like a potential rapist, so a group of hotheaded vigilantes took off and captured him. He spoke too little English to defend himself and since he was French and thus assumed to be oversexed, they immediately convicted and hanged him without a trial. The girls' stories later seemed to indicate strongly that he was innocent, but that was too late to save him. He was buried in a small local cemetery of a dozen graves including one that housed a Hanson uncle of mine who had died in infancy.

It was another man of French ancestry, I think, who made local headlines in the mid-1930s. Jack Loushin (or Luchine, or something we pronounced Loosheen) was a sort of local ne'er do well who apparently needed some gasoline one winter night. John Anderson, the local Chevrolet dealer, rented empty space in his heated showroom on winter nights for locals who wanted to keep their cars from freezing. One cold night, Jack broke into Anderson's showroom and siphoned out a few gallons of gas from one of the cars. He made the mistake of lighting a cigarette during the process and started his stolen gas and himself on

RICH WITHOUT MONEY Before 1940 on the Mesabi Iron Range

Minnesota's iron ranges mark a northern frontier of the United States. There were no gun-toting horsemen, but frontier attributes like physical strength, crude language, hard drinking, and skillful hunting were admired; and except perhaps for clergy, men who read too many books and spoke and behaved with gentility were looked upon with great suspicion.

Many of these frontiersmen ignored some laws, especially those that limited drinking, poaching, or trespassing. There was even a lynching in my home town in 1894. A young French itinerant who spoke little English was impolitely urged to get out of town. It appears that he may have stopped a short distance out

of town to relieve himself and a pair of young girls about 10 years old observed him through the bushes. When they were overheard discussing the sight of his private parts, the locals jumped to the conclusion that this sex maniac--as all Frenchmen were assumed to be--had been attempting rape. Five or six men took the law into their own hands and caught and hanged him without a trial. A later, more objective review of the girls' reports seemed to prove that he was innocent.

This was a town which had sprung up on the site where explorers had discovered the great mineral wealth of Minnesota's Mesabi Iron Range in 1890. Ore from the Mesabi produced two thirds of the world's supply of iron and steel for the next fifty years. In spite of the riches which came out of the earth, the people who lived there did not become wealthy. In fact, economists described the Mesabi Range of the 1920s as very poor with little hope for improvement. Even so, life on the Mesabi Range in the 1920s and 1930s, while not easy, was interesting, fulfilling, and perhaps unique in the United States. And those of us who lived there then felt more privileged than deprived.

My home town, Mountain Iron, Minnesota, with about 1,400 people was fairly typical of ten or so villages strung out along the

Centroversy rages after 82 years

EDITOR'S NOTE: Two weeks age the Maverick printed a story by Robyn Radomski about a long-forgetten graveyard in Mountain from that still beids a mystery about the 1894 hanging of an alloged rapid.

The Maverick this week received a letter from Elizabeth Politier in Washington, D. C., who offers a different version of the story. Below is an excerpt from the Maverick's account of the tale. Following it is Politier's letter and story. The Maverick thanks her for her contribution.

As told by the Maverick

The following account is based upon a story told to Clarence beck by Charlie Kosala, who heard it from his father.

According to the story, a young Frenchman was buried out in the woods and later moved to the cemetery.

Story has it that he had assaulted a young Mountain iron girl. The local vigilantes lined up all the men in town and the girl's father carried the child past the line-up in hopes she could identify the culprit.

After the child couldn't identify her assaulter, it seems that the old station master remembered a young fellow hitchhiking on a caboose of the old Duluth, Missabe and Iron Range Railroad which ran through town. He wired shead to Iron Junction, where the train was headed, and the Prenchman was brought into town, where the girl identified him so rapist.

After a kangaroo court son sion, the man was hanged.

Polition's letter

I was particularly interested and appalled at the story of the lynching, so I felt obligated to write the story using factual material, quoting Englishspeaking sources.

I used fictitious names, but I do know the sames of some of the people involved. I discussed the tragedy with one in particular. At first she was on the defensive, but as we continued our talk, she became less sure of herself, especially when I reminded her that all the men involved in the crime except one diod in less than a year after the lynching, and her first husband was one of them.

when we heard Mr. Greene's touching words of regret (related below). It is significant that he had no part in the murder and that he was penitent and sorrowful 36 years later.

I suggest Mountain Iron erect a small monument in the church yard to the victim of man's inhumanity to man with the inscription,: " 'Vengesnee is mine,' saith the Lord."

A worthwhile project evolving from the garbled ersion of the story could be inculcating in Range people respect for various ethnic groups to eliminate the cult of prefixing denigrating adjectives to the name of any nationality. St. Cyr, the victim, could have been referred to as an American of: French descent rather than as a "wild" Frenchman. A fewyears in Washington where 73!: percent of the people are bisck-would really educate the smug Rangers.

The old graveyard was on the side of the iroquois mine and east of the school. It was about a quarter to half a mile from the Wacootsh mine which didn't exist then. Surrounding each piciest feace to protect it from the cows that grazed at will over the lash area, as there was no fence enclosing the entire cemetery.

I think all the bodies were moved to Virginia years before the streetcar tracks were laid and long before the area was used for the school gardens.

It is my sincere hope that after a Mountain from Day of Atonement, the ghouls, bigots and sadists allow the matter to rest. Grandchildren of the lynchers still have to live with it, unfortunately.

in Mountain Iron in 1894 a Mr. and Mrs. Greene and two young daughters lived in a hotel, the Miner's Home. The parents were self-respecting people who believed in discipline, but life for the children was more or less free and easy. The men spoiled the little girls

by giving them money until the children developed the habit of cadging, particularly from

strangers. One day a young American of French descent named St. Cyr came to town from Cloquet where he had been employed as a fireman on an engine. He was unable to get a job there so he decided to go to Virginia to try his luck. During his short stay in Mountain Iron, the two Greene children pestered him for money which he did not have.

There was no Wacootah mine at that time, so the Virginia road ran directly east from the achool; and the woods were close to town.

In 1894 there were no rest rooms or filling stations, so, because of the Greene girls following and pestering him, St. Cyr had to sook privacy to relieve himself in the woods. To get rid of the girls, he gave them his knife to cut whistles.

One of the children cut her hand accidentally and, at the sight of blood, the girls went howling home to their parents, telling them St. Cyr had cut them. They were afraid to confess to their begging activi-Carry .

There were no vigilantes in Mountain Iron. A self-appointed group of lawless men overtook St. Cyr, who was not trying to escape, and lynched him without a legal trial. St. Cyr was a devout Catholic, so he was allowed to say his prayers.

His body was carted to town where the righteous women speered at him and jeered him. One woman actually spat in the dead man's face.

St. Cyr's relatives gave him a Catholic burial in Goquet.

Epilogue


. The Minnesota Historical Society met in Mountain Iron in 1930 with Mr. Greene (the children's father) as a guest speaker. He told about early days in Mountain Iron, and he

ended on a sad and penitent note, saying, "Mountain Iron has a blot on its history, and i would do anything if it weren't there.

Mr. Greene had not been one of the men guilty of the crime of taking the law into their own inept hands.

in less than a year after the tragedy, every man who had taken part in the lynching but one was dead. Their vindictive wives had to lead lives of drudgery and poverty, although some remarried. The sole male survivor drowned his miscry and feelings of guilt in alcohol.
