MINUTES MOUNTAIN IRON CITY COUNCIL SEPTEMBER 20, 2004

Mayor Skalko called the City Council meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. with the following members present: Joe Prebeg, Jr., Allen Nelson, Dale Irish, Ed Roskoski, and Mayor Gary Skalko. Also present were: Craig J. Wainio, City Administrator; Jill M. Forseen, Municipal Services Secretary; Don Kleinschmidt, Director of Public Works; Larry Nanti, Director of Parks and Recreation; Rod Flannigan, City Engineer; and Sam Aluni, City Attorney.

The Mayor made some comments regarding the last City Council meeting and he said there were some things that bothered him. He stated that he would take full responsibility for what happened at the end of the last meeting. The Mayor said that at times the Council is getting too personnel at the meetings, he requested the Council to stick with the issues and not the personalities.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg that the consent agenda be approved as follows:

- 1. Approve the minutes of the September 7, 2004, City Council meeting with the following correction: Page 3, add after paragraph 10, "At 8:06 p.m., Councilor Prebeg returned to the meeting."
- 2. Approve the minutes of the September 15, 2004, Special City Council meeting as submitted.
- 3. That the communications be accepted, placed on file, and those requiring further action by the City Council be acted upon during their proper sequence on the agenda.
- 4. To acknowledge the receipts for the period September 1-15, 2004, totaling \$114,556.53, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).
- 5. To authorize the payments of the bills and payroll for the period September 1-15, 2004, totaling \$433,145.99, (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).

The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

At 6:35 p.m., it was moved by Prebeg and supported by Irish to recess the regular meeting and open the public hearing on the USDA Loan Application. The motion carried.

The Mayor explained that the public hearing was a requirement if the City decides to obtain a loan for the library from the USDA. He explained that the public hearing was just part of the loan application process.

Councilor Irish asked the Mayor what the interest rate on the loan would be. The Mayor stated that he did not know.

Councilor Prebeg asked if a loan amount had to be stipulated. The Mayor said that the application that the City Administrator was working on was for \$250,000.

At 6:38 p.m., it was moved by Irish and supported by Prebeg to close the public hearing and reconvene the regular meeting. The motion carried.

During the public forum, two Representatives from the Coalition of Greater Minnesota Cities spoke.

The Mayor's reported that he received information from Saint Louis County Commissioner Nelson that County Road 102 would be overlayed next Summer. The Mayor stated that Mr. Skube from Minntac put in writing that there would be a ten year period that there would be no mining on the County Road 102.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg to accept the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission and approve the Conditional Use Permit for Larry Tviet, 5494 Carnation Avenue, Parcel Code 175-0013-00020, to construct an accessory building 1500 square feet. The motion carried.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Nelson to approve the final accounting report for the Park Ridge Development Project, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried with Councilor Roskoski voting no.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Nelson to call for quotes for the emergency water line extension from the Mountain Iron water system to the Virginia water system. The motion carried.

The Director of Public Works reported that Saint Louis County would be repairing the pot holes on County Road 761 and Old Highway 169. He said that the overlay process was in the Saint Louis County Engineering Department and there was no confirmation yet from the County when this project would be done. He said that the Intersection at County Road 761 and Old Highway 169 was going to be redone and the access further to the west would be eliminated.

The Mayor questioned the Director of Public Works regarding the digging by the Corner Spur. The Director of Public Works said that the work was being completed by a contractor hired by the owners of the Corner Spur, they were looking for a water line leak on their property.

Councilor Irish asked the Director of Public Works if when Saint Louis County was contacted about overlaying County Road 102 that a request be made to overlay Mineral Avenue through the Downtown Mountain Iron area and South Grove. The Director of Public Works stated that the original request to the County was to have the County Road 102 overlay completed from Highway 53 through to County Road 7.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Irish that the Insurance Report received from the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance Trust be filed and tabled for further study and consideration. After further discussion, Councilor Roskoski amended the motion to include the report being sent to the Parks and Recreation Board, the Downtown Committee, and the Streets and Alley Committee for review and recommendations. Councilor Irish supported the amendment. The amended motion carried with Councilor Nelson voting no.

The Mayor asked the Recreation Director to contact other Cities to see if there were issues regarding the displays in their towns for insurance purposes.

At 7:47 p.m., Councilor Roskoski left the meeting.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg to accept the recommendation of the Safety Committee and approve the amendment to the services agreement with the Minnesota Municipal Utilities Association, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried on the following roll call vote: Nelson, yes; Irish, yes; Roskoski, absent; Prebeg, yes; and Skalko, yes.

At 7:49 p.m., Councilor Roskoski returned to the meeting.

It was moved by Irish and supported by Prebeg to authorize the Recreation Director to purchase advertising in the Iron Trail Convention and Visitors Bureau ads in the amount of \$1,685.00. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Nelson and supported by Prebeg to authorize payment request number one for the Water Treatment Plant Backflush Tank to Hibbing Excavating, Inc. in the amount of \$31,234.10. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

The Mayor said he was approached by a resident on Spring Park Road asking what the status of the upgrades to the water extension, sewer extension, and road upgrades in the Spring Park area were. The City Engineer said that all of the cost estimates were prepared. It was the consensus of the Council to have the City Engineer review this project.

Councilor Roskoski asked the City Engineer regarding the granular options for Heather Avenue. The City Engineer stated that he looked into the ground up asphalt option and that if the contractors ground up the asphalt fine enough for usage, they would recycle it and use it in their own bituminous.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Irish to direct the City Administrator to contact the two firms that did the original appraisals on the desert/dump/USX land site in Section 9 & 10 and use their original information plus the new Benchmark Engineering study information and each would prepare two new appraisals. One value with the old garbage dump that is circa 1920-1950 left as is, not abated, and another value as if the garbage dump were dug out and refilled with dirt. After further discussion, Councilor Roskoski amended his motion to change from calling for new appraisals to ask the appraisers to modify, clarify, or supplement their appraisals. Councilor Irish supported the amendment. The amended motion carried with Councilor Nelson voting no.

It was moved by Nelson to drop the entire USX Land site clean-up project. The motion died for lack of support.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Irish that the City of Mountain Iron use the old garbage dump area between Downtown and South Grove on the east site of Mineral Avenue, the most southerly dump site, as a permanent site for temporary storage of various types of soils, construction materials, and related items as confirmed by numerous recent

correspondences from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) and have all current correspondences on the pages 51, 52, and 53 of the current City Council meeting packet from the MPCA reaffirming that the City is in compliance with pertinent rules and regulations will be attached and become a part of this motion and become a part of this meeting's minutes. After further discussion, Councilor Roskoski amended his motion to include applying to the MPCA regional office as stated in the attached e-mail and contingent on the approval from the MPCA. Councilor Irish supported the amendment. The amended motion carried with Councilor Prebeg and Nelson voting no.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Irish that the City Council accept the Locomotive Park upgrading specifications as presented and seek quotes on this project with the quotes being made available to the City Council before the October 4, 2004, meeting with Benchmark Engineering calling for the quotes. The motion carried with Councilors Prebeg and Nelson voting no.

It was moved by Skalko and supported by Irish to adopt Resolution Number 39-04, rescinding the dissolution of the Mountain Iron Housing and Redevelopment Authority, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried with Councilor Nelson voting no.

It was moved by Prebeg and supported by Skalko to adopt Resolution Number 40-04, reserving recreation lands, (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried.

It was moved by Irish and supported by Roskoski to authorize an advertisement to be published in the Mountain Iron-Buhl School Yearbook in the amount of \$120. The motion carried unanimously on a roll call vote.

It was moved by Irish and supported by Roskoski to authorize Councilor Irish to contact the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency regarding the noise and odor problems at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. After further discussion, Councilor Irish amended his motion to change the contact from Councilor Irish to City Staff to set up meeting before October 4, 2004. Councilor Roskoski supported the amendment. The amended motion carried with Councilor Prebeg voting no.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Irish that in regards to Locomotive Park:

- 1. That City Workers remove the large bolts down to the concrete level, from the concrete hoist bases and the hoist house foundations using any method that they can think of, i.e. torch, grinder, etc.
- 2. That the City Workers remove all dirt and debris left over from the utility installation project down to the original grass level except for necessary small mounding over the trenched areas to allow for settling.

The completion of these projects will be before Fall freeze-up of 2004, except for the dirt and debris that may have to be removed sooner to facilitate any Mesabi Trail construction in that area. The motion carried with Councilors Prebeg and Nelson voting no.

It was moved by Roskoski and supported by Skalko to have the City Council recommend that the EDA/HRA invite Eric Oakman and any other P & H Representatives to an HRA/EDA regular meeting as soon as possible to discuss any future P & H relocation plans and also review with those people any potential usable sites that the City has in town. And further, that whenever that meeting is set up, to have the Mayor and all City Council members to be notified when and where that meeting will take place. The motion carried with Councilors Prebeg and Nelson voting no.

At 9:12 p.m., it was moved by Roskoski and supported by Prebeg that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried.

The services agreement entered into between Minnesota Municipal Utilities Association (MMUA) and Mountain Iron Public Utilities (Mountain Iron), dated September 15, 2003, contract number 85-2004, is amended as follows:

PART II, Section 1.

1. DURATION: This Agreement shall remain in force from October 1, 2004 until September 30, 2005 (the "expiration date").

PART III, Section 1.

1. COMPENSATION: For the services covered by this Agreement, Mountain Iron shall pay MMUA an annual fee of twelve thousand five hundred forty-three dollars and 46 cents (\$ 12,543.46) for the 2004-05 annual period. Heidi:

Dale Irish, Mtn Iron city council, contacted me about a former city dump that was covered and planted. He wanted to know if the property could currently be used to store recyclable materials as well as a staging area for public works projects. The public works staging would consist of materials such as culverts, excavation spoil piles, and possibly old concrete curbs from roads.

I talked with John Moeger earlier and he believed that use of the former dump would not be a problem as long as the use does not damage or erode the existing cover. However, I think this is your area. Would you be able to provide an opinion to determine if the property can be used in some capacity as decribed above? Are there other limitations?



RESOLUTION NUMBER 39-04

RESCINDING THE DISSOLUTION OF THE MOUNTAIN IRON HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUCNIL OF MOUNTAIN IRON, MINNESOTA, as follows:

Section 1. Findings.

- 1.01 The City Council did, on the 19th day of April, 2004, establish the Mountain Iron Economic Development Authority pursuant to Minn. Stat. §469.090 to §469.108, and did grant the Mountain Iron Economic Development Authority all of the powers, authority, and duties of a Housing and Redevelopment Authority.
- 1.02 The City Council finds that notwithstanding the establishment of the Mountain Iron Economic Development Authority ("Mountain Iron EDA"), there is a need for the continued existence of a separate Housing and Redevelopment Authority of the City of Mountain Iron (the "Mountain Iron HRA") for the purpose of holding title to certain Mountain Iron HRA assets, the transfer of which would be costly, difficult, impracticable, or impossible.
- 1.03 The City Council did, on the 19th day of April, 2004, adopt Resolution Number 19-04, which provided for the transfer and dissolution of the Mountain Iron HRA.

Section 2. Rescission of Dissolution of HRA.

2.01 Rescission of Dissolution. Resolution Number 19-04, adopted by the City Council on the 19th day of April, 2004, providing for the dissolution of the Mountain Iron HRA, is hereby rescinded in its entirety.

Section 3. Authority.

3.01 Authority. It shall be the policy of the City of Mountain Iron that upon adoption of this Resolution any and all new development projects of any type or kind undertaken within the City of Mountain Iron be conducted under the authority of the Mountain Iron Economic Development Authority. It shall be the further policy of the City of Mountain Iron that the administration of existing development projects in the City of Mountain Iron under the authority of the HRA be hereby transferred to the EDA to the maximum extent possible.

- 3.02 Transfer. The City of Mountain Iron consents to the transfer of all records, all employees, and all reasonably transferable assets of the Mountain Iron HRA to the authority, supervision, and control of the Mountain Iron Economic Development Authority.
- 3.03 HRA to Hold Title. It shall be the policy of the City of Mountain Iron that the Mountain Iron HRA remain in existence for the purpose of holding title to assets of the HRA involving existing HRA development projects which are impracticable to transfer to the EDA because of encumbrances and/or other restrictions. The City of Mountain Iron consents to the transfer to the EDA of any unencumbered assets of the HRA which are to be used in conjunction with new development projects within the City of Mountain Iron.

Section 4. Implementation.

- 4.01 Officers Authorized to Act. The Mayor, City Council, City Administrator, and other appropriate City Officials are authorized and directed to take the actions and execute and deliver the documents necessary to give full effect to this resolution. To the extent the consent of the City of Mt. Iron is required as a condition precedent to the members and officers of the HRA and EDA taking such actions and executing and delivering such documents necessary to give full effect to this resolution, such consent is hereby given.
- 4.02 Effective Date. This resolution is effective upon adoption.





Re: Options for Granular Road Base

Dear Mayor Skalko and City Staff:

As requested I have researched the availability and cost of various granular road base material.

Recycled concrete makes a good durable road base and has pieces of reinforcement steel in the crushed material, which presets a road hazard problem and would not be a recommended for a granular surface.

Recycled bituminous creates a good granular surface, but this material compacts to a very hard surface and can only be graded in warm weather conditions due to the residual oils in the material which becomes hard during cooler weather. Also, the addition of material for maintenance purposes should also be recycled bituminous to keep the road base uniform. This would require a stockpile of the recycled bituminous material.

I have contacted MnDOT materials personal due to the fact that the recycled bituminous, as a street surface, is experimental at this time. Recycled bituminous for base material is typically done by milling the existing bituminous into the existing base and then paving over the top of that milled and graded material. Preliminary conversations with contractors have indicated that the recycled bituminous is valuable to them as a bituminous paving material and they would have to charge more for the recycled bituminous than the standard class-5 used for road base. Availability of the recycled bituminous is uncertain due to contractors need for the material. Contractors have also indicated that the material solidifies in the stockpile and is difficult to work loose, therefore a small stockpile of about 40 yards is recommended.

Another material being used for road base is the crushed waste rock from the mines, which is called mill feed. Mill feed meets the specifications for class-5 and is more moisture tolerant than normal class-5. Mill feed does contain sharp edged material due to the fact that it is crushed form a hard rock formation.



Enclosed is the completed grant agreement for the public library accessibility project at the Mountain Iron Public Library. As specified in the application, the project must begin within 180 days of receipt of the grant agreement.

The grant proposal is part of the grant agreement. Any grant application additions or clarifications made to obtain the grant are now part of the grant agreement. If alteration to the accessibility plan must be made, you must consult with me first. Altering any part of the plan without consultation and approval will jeopardize your grant. Additionally, as agreed to in the application, the grant funds will be used only for purposes specified in the proposal.

I have enclosed a recommended news release for the local news media. Please include in any publicity or flyers concerning the renovation the statement: "This project was funded in part with a public library accessibility grant administered by State Library Services and School Technology, Minnesota Department of Education."

Payment of up to \$112,500 will be made in accordance with Article IV after the project has been completed. When you apply for reimbursement, please provide the following documentation:

- 1. Certificate of Occupancy or such other type or form of certificate as is customarily issued by the municipality such as plumbing or electrical inspection
- 2. Photocopies of all required building permits
- 3. Photocopies of any change orders that substantially altered the grant proposal objective(s)
- 4. Photocopies of contracts let for this project
- 5. A budget grouping vendors and their costs relating to each accessibility component.
- 6. The amount of money the city anticipates receiving from the grant. If the project comes in under budget, the City receives only half of what was actually spent. If the project comes in over budget, the City receives only the maximum stated in the grant agreement.
- 7. Photocopies of invoices and payments for all items related to the accessibility project.
- 8. A statement from each contractor that prevailing wages were paid to personnel working on the project and that such documentation will be provided upon request. (Once contractors receive payment, they loathe any additional paper work. I recommend you obtain the statement as a condition for payment.)
- 9. A narrative summary indicating that the project described in Attachment D (the grant proposal) was accomplished.
- 10. Before and after print photographs of each accessibility project component. Renovations unrelated to accessibility matters should not be included.
- 11. If the renovation included costs not covered by the accessibility project, provide the total cost of the project.

Please complete the enclosed survey concerning your experience of the grant process. Your response will assist me in evaluating our procedures.

SMALL CITIES UPDATE September 27, 2004

Meet with MAOSC at the LMC Annual Conference

Sunday mornings are generally taboo times for meetings, but the League of Cities switch in dates and shortened timeframe for its annual meeting left no other time for affiliate groups like the Minnesota Association of Small Cities (MAOSC) to gather. So, as unlikely as it may seem, we are inviting small city officials to join us for a morning brunch and information-sharing session at 10 a.m. on Sunday, October 10, at the Holiday Inn, Duluth, Lake Michigan Room. However, since it is only three months away from the next legislative session, this will give us the opportunity to discuss small city issues that are already bubbling to the surface. Members will also have the chance to review, comment and adopt MAOSC's 2005 legislative priorities and annual budget. We hope you can join us for food and shoptalk.

Earnings gap a concern for rural small cities

A study by the State Demographer has highlighted an issue of growing concern for many rural small cities. The urban-rural earning gap, which has never been good, is rapidly widening, even within the same industries. According to a story in the September 17 issue of the Minneapolis Star and Tribune, "per capita income in Hennepin County, the state's richest (\$44,302 in 2002), is more than twice as high as the state's poorest, Mahnomen County, in the northwestern part of the state (\$20,547)." Some larger rural cities and small cities in the northern lakes areas are doing better, but red flags are going up in many parts of the state. If your city is in an "income gap" area, make sure to contact your legislative candidates and tell them their help is needed now, more than ever. If viable communities are to be maintained throughout the state, the Local Government Aid program must be strengthened, not drained.

Funding for wastewater projects trickling to a stop

Like the old nursery rhyme, "For lack of a nail...the war was lost," the lack of a bonding bill is having serious consequences on wastewater projects now and in years to come. The inability of the legislature to pass the bonding bill in order to fund either the State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan program or the Wastewater Infrastructure Fund (WIF) grant program means that next year, federal dollars will be lost instead of leveraged, and cities that have not begun the bidding process will most likely be out of the running when it comes to funding. Meanwhile, as the legislature stays idle, projects back up, costs rise, mandates increase and the needs list grows longer. This is particularly vexing for cities being fined for violations as they await funding for their long-overdue projects, and it affects the Metropolitan Waste Commission as well as individual communities. It is a problem that erodes both the low-interest loan program and the grant program, and it is one that only the legislature can fix. Please contact legislative candidates if you have current or future wastewater needs or if you simply care about the quality of Minnesota's ground and surface water and ask them to quickly pass a bonding bill that includes funding for wastewater projects.

Changes ahead in wastewater and storm water regs and funding

There are changes in the wind for both wastewater and storm water regulations and funding, so good communications with agencies such as the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) and the Public Facilities Authority (PFA) are more important than ever. MAOSC lobbyist Nancy Larson is working with the agencies in assessing the new Project Priority List (PPL) Point System for wastewater systems, developing a new solution to dealing with unsewered areas, and providing input regarding the MPCA's proposed changes to the agency's Administrative Penalty Orders. We're all under the gun, so MAOSC's role is to make sure the unique needs of small cities are addressed. It's important for you to keep connected, too.
