MINUTES MOUNTAIN IRON CITY COUNCIL February 6, 2023

Mayor Anderson called the City Council meeting to order at 6:30p.m. with the following members present: Councilor Ed Roskoski, Al Stanaway, Joe Prebeg Jr., Julie Buria and Mayor Peggy Anderson. Also present were: Craig Wainio, City Administrator; Tim Satrang, Public Works Director; Anna Amundson, Library Director/Special Events Coordinator; Amanda Inmon, Municipal Services Secretary; Alan Johnson, City Engineer; Bryan Lindsay, City Attorney; and SGT Grant Toma, Sheriff's Department.

It was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Buria the consent agenda be approved as follows:

- 1. Approve the minutes of the January 17, 2023 regular meeting as submitted.
- 2. That the communications be accepted and placed on file and those requiring further action by the City Council be acted upon during their proper sequence on the agenda.
- 3. To acknowledge the receipts for the period January 16-31, totaling \$208,858.15 (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes),
- 4. To authorize the payments of the bills and payroll for the period January 16-31, totaling \$382,973.80 (a list is attached and made a part of these minutes).

The motion carried (Yes: Buria, Anderson, Prebeg, Stanaway; No: Roskoski)

It was moved by Roskoski to amend the original motion to remove the Napa Auto Parts and Parts City bills from the consent agenda for separate consideration. The motion failed due to lack of support.

Public Forum:

No one spoke during the forum

The Mayor reported on the following:

> Thank you Tara LaMorea, Paula Satrang, Margaret Soyring, and Margaret Ratai for all their years of volunteer service to the several City committees and board that they served upon

City Administrator:

> No formal report

It was moved by Roskoski that the City of Mountain Iron mail notices to all current Parkville area residents and advertise in Hometown Focus and Mesabi Tribune the upcoming meeting, to be scheduled by staff to discuss the potential permanent closing of the north Parkville street road route in the near future. The motion failed due to lack of support.

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It was moved by Roskoski and seconded by Prebeg for the City of Mountain Iron to hire Benchmark Engineering to do a traffic count on the north Parkville Street/Road as soon as possible. If Benchmark cannot do it, Staff will contact St. Louis County Highway Department to do the count, if they cannot do it, then the Mountain Iron City Staff will schedule a City Employee to do a manual eight-hour day usage count out there to find out what the traffic flow is on those two City Streets. Councilor Prebeg rescinded his second to the motion, the motion failed due to lack of support.

It was moved by Roskoski, that since the first red iron ore on the Mesabi Iron Range was discovered in Mountain Iron and since Mountain Iron has a historic Carnegie Library, all which draws many tourists into our Community and area, that our City Administrator submit a Cultural and Tourism Grant or any other Grant Program Application in the amount of \$50,000 to the IRRR to cover some of the costs to replace two heating boilers in the Library and to repair curbing and pavement on Main Street. The motion failed due to lack of support.

Director of Public Works:

> Compliment the Fire Department crew on the recent fire in Parkville area, multiple Departments

It was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Stanaway to accept the recommendation from the UAB and approve the City of Mountain Iron's Electrical System-5-year plan as presented from Iron Range Engineering and Consulting Services. The motion carried.

It was moved by Buria and seconded by Stanaway to accept the service order quote for the pump repair at the Water Treatment Plant from GPM Inc. in the amount of \$14,700.54. The motion carried on roll call vote.

It was moved by Stanaway and seconded by Roskoski to adopt the 2023 Mountain Iron Library Policy Manual as presented. The motion carried.

It was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Buria to accept the letter of resignation of Gerald Knapper from the position as a Laborer, with an effective date of Friday, January 27, 2023. The motion carried.

It was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Stanaway to approve the recommendation of the Personnel Committee and authorize the internal posting for two Equipment Operators as specified in the Collective Bargaining Agreement. Applications accepted until 4:00pm, February 17, 2023. The motion carried.

It was moved by Stanaway and seconded by Buria to approve Resolution #01-23; Censuring Council Member Edward Roskoski (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried with Councilor Roskoski abstaining.

Discussion ensued regarding censure-ship.

It was moved by Prebeg and seconded by Buria to approve Resolution #02-23; Approving Plans and Specifications and Ordering Advertisement for Bids for Improvement Number 21-07, construction of Parkview Trail Interconnect (a copy is attached and made a part of these minutes). The motion carried on roll call vote (Yes: Anderson, Prebeg, Stanaway, and Buria; No: Roskoski).

It was moved by Roskoski to amend the motion to have the City of Mountain Iron advertise in the Hometown Focus and Mesabi Tribune upcoming meeting to be scheduled by staff, about the Parkville Trail interconnect project so the City can get feedback from Parkville residents to the location of the future trail. The motion failed due to lack of support.

It was moved by Stanaway and seconded by Buria to approve Resolution #03-23; Authorizing Execution of a Limited Use Permit between the City of Mountain Iron and the Commissioner of Transportation, State of Minnesota for Parkville Interconnect trail right-of-way. The motion carried on roll call vote (Yes: Anderson, Prebeg, Stanaway, and Buria; No: Roskoski).

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RESOLUTION NUMBER 01-23

CENSURING COUNCILMEMBER EDMUND ROSKOSKI

WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Mountain Iron ("City Council") has adopted a Code of Conduct and adopted a resolution confirming a commitment to service and civility to clarify the conduct expectations of Council members and the Mayor; and

WHEREAS, the Code of Conduct describes the manner in which the Mayor and Council members should treat one another, city staff, consultants, constituents, and others with whom they have contact while representing the City of Mountain Iron; and

WHEREAS, the Code of Conduct reflects the work of the Mayor and City Council in defining more clearly the behavior, manners, and courtesies that are suitable for various occasions; and

WHEREAS, the constant and consistent theme through all of the Code of Conduct guidelines is "respect;" and

WHEREAS, the Code of Conduct notes that despite the pressures of making decisions that impact the lives of citizens, elected officials are called upon to exhibit appropriate behavior at all times; and

WHEREAS, the Code of Conduct specifically states in part that all Councilmembers are:

- To conduct themselves in both their official and personal actions in a manner that is above reproach and in the discussion of City business to refrain from personal attacks upon or disparagement of any other member of the discussion and at all times to respect the authority of the Mayor to maintain order within the City's meetings.
- To be accountable for their actions and behaviors and accept responsibility for their decisions.
- To oppose all forms of harassment and unlawful discrimination.
- To be respectful of citizens, city staff, officials, volunteers, and others who participate in or come into contact with the city's government and to never disparage another's lifestyle, religion, culture or history.

WHEREAS, the City Council and members of the public observing Council meeting have observed that Council member Edmund Roskoski violates the Code of Conduct by failing to observe and respect the authority of the Mayor in the control of the meeting in that he fails to move discussion forward or refrain from interruption and delay within the meetings, has made personal attacks in

discussion, to wit, referring to the Mayor as "a bitch" which conduct can be observed approximately twenty-four and one half minutes into the regular Council meeting held January 3, 2023; and

WHEREAS, said complaint is documented in the recording of the proceedings of the January 3, 2023 meeting; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered all evidence presented to it with respect to the aforementioned complaint, all of which is hereby incorporated into this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, Councilor Roskoski has previously been censured by the Council during the fall of 2022.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Mountain Iron hereby resolves as follows:

- 1. That during his tenure as a member of the Mountain Iron City Council, Councilmember Roskoski violated the Code of Conduct through his actions at City Council meetings as outlined and described above.
- 2. That pursuant to its authority under the rules of procedure, Councilmember Roskoski is censured and it is specifically noted that conduct such as alleged above is not in line with the expectation or tradition of the City of Mountain Iron.
- 3. That Councilmember Roskoski is once again directed to henceforth abide by the Code of Conduct. Without limitation, Councilmember Roskoski is specifically directed to observe and respect the authority of the Mayor, to refrain from personal attacks including calling names and the use of foul language and to treat members of the Council, staff, and those working for and with the City of Mountain Iron with respect and free from harassment and intimidation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall be effective immediately upon passage.

Any bidder whose responsibility is questioned during consideration of the bid will be given an opportunity to address the council on the issue of responsibility. No bids will be considered unless sealed and filed with the clerk and accompanied by a cash deposit, cashier's check, bid bond or certified check payable to the City Administrator for ten percent of the amount of such bid.

In the heart of the city, adjacent to the school, lies acres of forest, streams, wetlands, and interconnecting trails which form the MIB Environmental Learning Laboratory. We are fortunate and proud to share this with our students, faculty, and the community to enhance their knowledge and support of the environment. Climate change education has become a focus of our educational efforts. MIB provides students with hands-on exploratory outdoor learning year-round. Students explore different parts of the ecosystem in the forest: trees-plants, mammals, the watershed, birds, amphibians, and reptiles. Exploratory teaching is achieved through nature hikes, guest speakers, arts-based projects, and experiential learning. Students spend time outside in all types of weather. We seek to enhance this outdoor teaching environment through the construction of an outdoor classroom and pavilion, bog walk learning deck and shade shack. We will also expand the School Forest Trail System. It is important that we construct these structures and trails to be accessible to all students so that they can have a hands-on outdoor learning experience. MIB created this Environmental Learning Center in 1983 and much of the development has been led by students, teachers, and volunteers under the direction of local DNR and County staff.

Since 1983, the city of Mountain Iron, the Mountain Iron-Buhl School District, Boy Scouts of America, Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, the Army Corp of Engineers, St. Louis County and others have partnered to create this outdoor learning area in a forest located next to the school. A system of trails exists, as well as benches, a campfire ring and privy along with environmental laboratory experiments and research. This proposal would create a permanent outdoor learning classroom and bog walk learning deck, as well as accessible forest trails for use by all learners. This school forest is also large enough for student athletes in cross country to utilize it for trail running practices and the community for skiing, snowshoeing, and forest hiking. With wetlands, a winding stream, bridges, berry patches, and forests, student achievement flourishes in a dynamic outdoor laboratory enhanced by dedicated teachers and volunteers. With a little investment, we can create an even better learning center for our kids.
